



# President's Message By Dori MacFarlane

Volunteering at ECHO has opened my eyes to the way the organization serves as a type of clearing house for our community.

When a client needs help in an area that ECHO is unable to cover, they are directed to whatever community agency may be able to assist them. Many times our client advocates work with a client to find the services they need. We keep lists of other food pantries in the area, and the days that they are open, and share those with people who are not able to access our pantry at the moment. We direct people to other nonprofits that may fit their needs, for example, Pregnancy Helpline for cribs and other baby items, the Humane Society for pet supplies, HealthNet for medical needs. In turn,

ECHO also shares excess supplies with other local nonprofits. We often get items from retailers that could benefit other agencies. Rita, Andrea, and Sandy inventory those items, and then look for places that can use them. We've given: medical supplies to HealthNet; clothing, car seats, diapers, pack-n-plays, blankets, bottles, and nursing items to Pregnancy Helpline; pails, garden hoses, spray bottles, rugs, animal bedding, brooms, exam gloves, lawn chairs, mops, community room chairs to the Humane Society; potting soil, garden hoses, shelving, sunscreen, clothing, plastic garbage cans to RECAP; clothing, art supplies musical instruments, gym items to the Janesville School District; blankets, bedding, supply pails, vacuums, diapers, apartment start-up items to Project 16:49; and books, clothing, shoes, coffee pots and furniture to the Rock County Housing 4 Our Vets program. When we get extra produce or more food items that we won't be able to use in an efficient manner, we share those with other food pantries around the area.

It is so rewarding to volunteer for an agency that gives back to the community in so many ways.

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### **Executive Director Message** By Jessica Locher, Executive Director



Summer is a time for relaxation and charging our batteries back up before the busy fall and holiday season. This summer has been hard for the staff and volunteers to recharge their batteries because the need is great in Rock County. ECHO appreciates the community's support of our mission to provide housing, food, and other basic human needs and address the barriers to self-sufficiency.

Service highlights from the first 6 months of 2023:

- Served over 2,200 unique households.
- Provided over 1.1 million meals.
- Provided 3,154 nights in local motels.
- Provided 123 months of rental assistance.
- Street Outreached to 236 people experiencing homelessness.

ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) funding to provide expanded services has come to an end. Inflation has caused the price of food and personal supplies to go up but wages or social security for our neighbors we help have not. ECHO services are the safety net many of our neighbors need to use so they don't become homeless. We provide case management and advocacy to help them with their barriers to self-sufficiency. We are a hand up not a handout. Without your help, the need in our communities would be even greater. Any size donation helps, cash, in-kind, or volunteering. With your support, so we can continue to meet the needs of those requesting food, rental assistance, emergency motel vouchers, and other supportive services such as transportation assistance, school supplies, and personal care products. United Way Blackhawk Region Funded Partner ECHO is excited to announce renewed funding from United Way Blackhawk Region for July 2023 - June 2025 for the ECHOWAY Program and the two Housing Navigator positions, totaling \$360,000 for the two-year period. ECHO is extremely grateful to have the continued support of United Way Blackhawk Region and its donors as we continue our work to serve and support Rock County's most-vulnerable populations.

ECHOWAY was established with our first United Way Blackhawk Region funds in 2012, and is a housing program, serving Rock County low-income people who are experiencing homelessness, or are at immediate risk of homelessness. They may be in ECHO's lodging

program, at local shelters, living in a car, temporarily living with someone, or may have received a 5-day notice. They must be willing to work to improve their situation by participating in case management. ECHO case managers help them work on budgeting, employment, and education access, and address other barriers to self-sufficiency. Seeing their case manager weekly while in lodging and at least monthly for rent assistance, they may receive a security deposit, single or multiple-month rent, utility assistance and other wrap-around services.

The United Way grant funds for ECHOWAY will be used for direct housing-related assistance for low-income people in Rock County, not just in the Janesville area. None of the funds will be used for staffing or operating costs. The funds will be used to pay security deposits; single- or multiple-month rent; utility assistance, including paying past bills if required to get the utilities turned on in the new apartment; and other direct costs related to stabilizing housing. The security deposit and rent funds go directly to the landlords or management companies, on the client's behalf. Utility and other assistance goes directly to the vendors, such as Alliant Energy. ECHO also uses other grants, as well as ECHO Donated Funds to get people out of homelessness and into stable housing.

The Housing Navigator position was created with funding from United Way Blackhawk Region in July 2019 and was expanded to include a second position in July 2022. The Housing Navigators assist homeless households with accessing permanent housing and consult with local service providers to identify appropriate housing opportunities for clients. The Housing Navigators also conduct outreach and recruitment of local landlords to inform them of the local service providers housing. They also provide client support, mentoring, and assistance with the navigation of community resources and services in the interest of aiding clients to progress toward greater self-sufficiency. They conduct assessments to determine clients' housing barriers, needs, and preferences to develop an action plan to secure housing. They assist clients with housing search mainly by contacting landlords and scheduling showings, but also by providing leads to clients and coaching clients on how to speak with potential landlords.

Again, we would like to thank United Way Blackhawk Region staff, volunteers, and donors for their faith in ECHO's ability to provide these much-needed services.

# **ECHO Partners with Alter Metal Recycling**

This past April, ECHO partnered with Alter Metal Recycling during its annual Go Green for the Green campaign, raising over \$69,000 in cash donations. Donations came from residents and area businesses who donated end-of-life scrap metal materials for recycling by Alter. During the Go Green for the Green Spring Fundraising event for ECHO, Alter generously doubled the value for the metal donated. ECHO's metal recycling account remains open throughout the year, so if you have

end-of-life objects around your house that are ready for the recycler, consider dropping them at Alter and saying you'd like to donate to the ECHO account. Donations can be made at any one of Alter's many locations throughout southern Wisconsin and Northern Illinois. If you are new to metal recycling, feel free to call or stop in at Alter and someone will be glad to show you what metal recyclers do for the community and the environment and how you too can play a role in that. Recycling is good for everyone!

Did you know that unlike other recyclable materials, metal is infinitely recyclable? That is, if it stays out of the landfill and gets to a local metal recycler! And unlike other recyclables you might put into your recycling bin at home, metal recyclers pay you to recycle. Whether it's ferrous metal, like iron and steel which sticks to a magnet, or nonferrous metals, such as brass, aluminum, or copper which a magnet won't stick to, it's all recyclable over and over again. To think that old fence or beverage can you recycle today could have been a bridge in a previous life or a ship hull in its next!

If you are not familiar with metal recycling and what Alter does, Alter buys metal scraps and end-of-life consumer goods made of metal for recycling. Once purchased, the metal is prepared to customer specifications, which generally includes sorting it by type and reducing its size by cutting or compacting. Once prepared, the recycled metal is shipped to customers who use the recycled metal to make new products. From broken aluminum lawn chairs to rusted-out grills, metal recyclers like Alter keeps valuable resources out of our landfills, assuring they get the opportunity to be made into something new. "Recycling our end-of-life consumer goods preserves our natural resources and is a great way to support American manufacturing," says Sarah Schlichtholz, Vice-President of Environment and Community of Alter, which supplies recycled metal to hundreds of manufacturers and businesses throughout the US.

Alter's metal recycling facility located at 1753 Beloit Avenue has been serving the community's recycling needs for over 50 years. In addition to its Go Green for the Green fundraising program, Alter hosts an annual Earth Day celebration, offering food, beverages, prizes, drawings and premium pricing on aluminum cans. Many people who may be new to recycling see the facility, processed material and equipment up close, like its 1000-ton mobile shear which was the largest in the United States at the time of purchase. Other equipment includes grapples and magnet cranes to move the metal and a handheld tester to read chemical make-ups of different metals called alloys.

Founded in 1898 and celebrating its 125-year anniversary, Alter Metal Recycling, a division of Alter Trading Corporation, is a fifth-generation company with metal recycling operations located throughout the Midwest. Alter Metal Recycling is committed to making a positive impact in the communities it serves, and regularly partners with local organizations to support important initiatives. The recent metal donation drive for ECHO is just one example of Alter's ongoing commitment to giving back through its metal fundraising initiatives designed to promote the many environmental, social, and financial benefits of community-based metal recycling.





Metal is infinitely recyclable and one of the most valuable of all the recyclable materials. Many consumer products in our homes are made from metal—appliances, lawn furniture, cans, clothes hangers and more. Not only is recycling metal important to keep this limited resource out of landfills, but recycling can earn you money!

# COMMON HOUSEHOLD METALS THAT CAN BE RECYCLED

The general rule is, if an item is at least 50% metal, it's worth recycling. If you have products with only a small amount of metal that is easily removable, separate the metal before coming to the scrap yard.

### **NON-FERROUS\* METALS**

Aluminum • Brass • Copper • Lead Nickel • Stainless Steel • Tin • Zinc

Examples: beverage cans, siding, gutters, silverware, wires, pipes, auto parts, keys, faucets, fixtures, handles, knobs, hinges

# FERROUS\* METALS

Steel · Cast Iron

Examples: pots and pans, appliances, mowers, outdoor furniture, fencing, tools, vehicles, trailers, campers, ironing boards, bikes, file cabinets, grills

\* Scrap metal is classified as either ferrous (containing iron, such as steel) and non-ferrous (everything else). You can identify whether your metal is ferrous or non-ferrous by using a magnet. Ferrous metals stick to a magnet; non-ferrous metals don't.

### **INSIDER TIPS**

- >>> Call the scale office to find out current pricing (which can change daily) and if there's a minimum amount of material you need to bring. They can also let you know what may be required if you are scrapping an old vehicle, trailer or boat.
- >>> Bring personal identification. This is required by law to prevent theft of metals, such as street signs and manhole covers.
