When we have events, we need someone to help organize and decorate. Are you handy? We currently have a house that sometimes needs repairs and have other opportunities for our handy men and women! Please consider how you can help out! If you'd like to brainstorm with one of us, give us a call. We'll help you figure out where to plug in.

Although I have many goals for ECHO, the last one that I will mention here is that I'd like to see our church board members come back to our meetings. Since Covid, we have seen a big drop off at our board meetings. We truly need the involvement of all of our board members so that we can be successful! If you are at one of our member churches, will you please check and see if someone is representing your church at our meetings? If not, would you please volunteer?

The Executive Committee and I are looking forward to serving ECHO alongside you! This year will have many challenges and we will meet them head-on with our dedicated staff, volunteers and Board of ECHO!

It has been an honor and a blessing to serve as ECHO's Board President for the last two years and on the Board for the past five years. During this time, I have had the privilege of watching ECHO grow tremendously under new leadership. Many new programs, such as PATH outreach, have been implemented. Collaboration with other local agencies, such as the YMCA, City of Janesville and Project 16:49, has allowed ECHO to serve the community in exciting new ways. With these new partnerships and new leadership, ECHO has responded to the growing need for food and housing services in this community. The staff at ECHO works tirelessly to provide these services with the help

of a team of dedicated volunteers. Thank you to all those who donate countless hours stocking shelves, filling food orders, creating holiday baskets, assisting with fundraising activities or any of the other ways to serve clients of ECHO.

A huge thank you to outgoing past President Nancy Hansen-Bennett. Your leadership, commitment and enthusiasm for spreading the mission of ECHO is truly inspiring.

This last year alone, ECHO provided 2,705,604 meals, 2,781 senior stock boxes, 282 months of rent, 10,553 motel nights, 600 thanksgiving baskets and 575 Christmas meals. That is astounding! And that is just a portion of the community services ECHO provides! None of this would be possible without the support ECHO receives from local businesses, school groups, volunteers, church communities and individual community members! Thank you for supporting ECHO!



Growth and Partnerships By Jessica Locher, Executive Director

The staff at ECHO are very proud of our growth and accomplishments over the last few years. We started a weekend food program for homeless students with the Janesville School District in Fall 2022 and weekend food program for youth at the YMCA of Northern Rock County in Summer 2021. We also expanded our emergency lodging program, Rapid Re-Housing program, and Housing and Resource Navigation. Much of the growth we have seen has been with new or strengthened partnerships. In this newsletter you will have the opportunity to learn more about our partnership with Project 16:49.

Our emergency lodging program has seen a lot of growth, thanks to government grants that were available due to pandemic relief funds. Thanks to your support and pandemic relief grants, we went from providing 2,967 nights in 2019 and 4,308 nights in 2020 to providing 9,292 nights in 2021 and 10,553 nights in 2022. This is a significant growth for a much-needed program in our community, as we are lacking affordable housing for our lower-income neighbors. Affordable housing should not be a taboo topic and looked down upon. Affordable housing is a right that everyone should have no matter your socioeconomic status and it should also be safe and secure. With your support, we are hopeful that we will be able to continue to provide the same level of services from the past two years as pandemic relief grants disappear.

Because affordable housing should be a right for all, we formed a partnership with Wisconsin Partnership for Housing Development. Together we were awarded funding from the City of Janesville's Pay It Forward to build six units of affordable housing for homeless families to live in for up to two years. During that time, we will assist them in removing barriers to self-sufficiency with weekly case management services. These units should be ready to be occupied by the end of 2023.

The above information is just a fraction of what is new or expanding at ECHO. I encourage you to set up a meeting with me or schedule a tour with Emily to learn more about ECHO and our mission of meeting housing, food and other basic human needs and addressing the barriers to self-sufficiency. Help Battle Homelessness in Rock County

Leadership Development Academy (LDA) team, Rock Forward, is working with ECHO to raise funds and awareness of the homelessness issue in Rock County.

What is LDA?

The Leadership Development Academy participants experience formal leadership training, extensive Real Colors development, stress management, self-awareness as a leader, expanded community exposure and involvement, and team building with a final team project.

Project:

Create promotional videos to bring awareness to the Housing & Homelessness programs ECHO has for low-income families. Team Rock Forward is working with Anthony Swindell of Up the Ante Productions to coordinate and produce short videos that define what ECHO does as an organization, what homelessness programs and resources they offer low-income families, and share success stories. ECHO will use these videos to help promote their services to the community and potential donors.

In addition to creating videos, team Rock Forward is looking to raise **\$15,000** to support the ECHO's motel voucher program.

Project 16:49 and ECHO By Jessica Pfeifer

I started with Project 16:49 as an intern and during my internship I discovered my passion for working with young adults. I was able to continue with Project 16:49 by serving as an AmeriCorps member for two years after I completed my internship. I have three teenagers and have found that life at home has made it easier to connect with the youth. Navigating resources is something that can be difficult at any age. I am really excited about this new position that was created so that I can help our Rock and Walworth County youth do so.

Project 16:49 recently collaborated with ECHO on two Youth Homeless Demonstration Project grants to create:

-A systems navigator position to provide increased outreach, advocacy, and case management support to homeless youth in community settings

-A Rapid Rehousing Program to provide rent assistance plus case management for ten youth in scattered site apartments.

Both initiatives allow us to better serve the needs of more of our community's homeless youth, and likely would not have happened without ECHO's partnership.

CROP Hunger Walk set for April 30



Janesville area walkers will "Bee the Change" to help end hunger on Sunday, April 30, during the 46th annual Janesville Area CROP Hunger Walk.

Organizers hope to raise \$50,000, and ECHO again will receive 25 percent of the total amount donated. The remaining funds will help the efforts of Church World Service (CWS), a faith-based organization that fights hunger and poverty in communities around the globe.

"Bee the Change" is the theme for this year's walk in recognition of CWS's efforts to help families in Kenya establish bee colonies so they can earn money by harvesting and selling honey. CWS provides families with a set of beehives, supplies to hang the beehives, harvesting equipment, training and honey-processing units.

On April 30, walkers can choose a 5K route that starts at Cargill United Methodist Church, 2000 Wesley Ave., Janesville, makes a loop along Milwaukee Street, Randall Avenue, Racine Street, through Palmer Park and back to the church via Lexington Drive. A shorter 2.5K route also is available. Registration for the walk will take place from 1 to 1:30 p.m.

Last year's Janesville area walk raised more than \$49,000 with about \$12,250 going to ECHO, a Janesville-based organization that helps provide temporary housing, food and transportation to people in need. Through the years, the Janesville area walk has raised more than \$1.28 million.

Walkers can sign up online individually or as a team at www.crophungerwalk.org/janesvillewi. Just click on "Register," fill in your details, and you'll find lots of tools to help you get started. There is no registration fee to participate, but walkers are encouraged to collect donations to support the cause.

Sixteen teams participated in the 2022 walk, and organizers hope that number will increase this year. Event coordinator Kathy Holcombe encourages area congregations, businesses and other groups to get involved in the fight to end hunger. A breakfast meeting for team captains is scheduled for 8:30 a.m. Saturday, March 4, at ECHO, 65 S. High St., Janesville. Recruiting materials will be distributed at the meeting, followed by a tour of ECHO. Captains planning to attend the meeting can RSVP to Holcombe at the number or email listed above.
